Baseball, Blessings and a Heart of Wisdom, by Pastor Tim Smiley

Then Peter spoke up, "We have left everything to follow you!" (Mark10:28)

I love baseball. I have loved it beginning in childhood. I fondly remember playing catch with my older brother and my father in the front yard. We held neighborhood pickup games in our backyard (Visiting that yard as an adult, I marvel how we even imagined we could play in such a small plot of grass!), until the point my father got tired of baseballs shattering Florida Room windows. He promised us that the next time we broke a window with an errant ball there would be a spanking. Lo and behold, a neighbor swung the bat, it flew from his hands and smashed through a window. When confronted by my father, I pleaded, "But it wasn't the baseball; it was the bat!" He just shook his head and walked away. But we were banished from the 7409 Olin Way backyard ballfield.

I played Little League and Senior League baseball, and the knock was "lots of potential but not enough result." Until my last year. My goal was

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to play on the All-Star team in the post-season. I practiced the game for hours every single day. I hung a strike zone on the chain link fence of the local VFW and pitched the rawhide off a lot of balls. I practiced and played with anyone breathing and willing to be



dragged out to the sandspur filled field. I was committed, focused, "all in." I dramatically improved my game. I pitched a complete game no-hitter that year, batted in the mid-300's, and roamed the outfield when not pitching. I just knew I was going to get that call from the All-Star coach. Except, something happened. I got saved!

Two young Navy couples served as Sr. High counselors, and with their care and counsel our youth ministry grew. Our church decided to hire a youth intern for the summer break. My church friends told me that the first weekend after the end of the school year we'd all be going to New Symrna Beach for a retreat. Not me, said I. I'd be home practicing and waiting for my call to join the All-Star team. But they talked me into going. It was great fun. And there were girls. But two things happened that weekend. First, we read and talked about Matthew 5, the opening chapter of Jesus' "Sermon on the Mount." I was intrigued with what Jesus said. And second, during a Saturday evening bonfire on the beach, as the youth worker led an informal worship service, I had an "out of body" experience. I was sitting with my friends around the bonfire, when suddenly I wasn't. I was floating a distance above the bonfire, looking down on my friends. And I heard a voice say to me, "You know I love you." I hovered there, savoring those words, and then found myself again sitting among my friends. I looked around – did anyone notice? No. And I said nothing to anyone.

Monday morning our home phone rang, and it was the All-Star coach inviting me to join the All-Star team. I thanked him for calling and told him no, that I would be busy with my church youth group all summer. And that was that!

Since that day I've played a lot of baseball and church softball. Now, at age 70, I can hardly throw a baseball because of a calcium buildup that aggravates my rotator cuff. But it's all good. I made my decision at the age of 15. And I've never looked back on that weekend in June with regret. I was "all in," but now it wasn't baseball. I willingly let go of my dream of the All-Star team for something far better – to know the Lord Jesus Christ and His love for me.

As we continue in worship to explore "The Way to Go," Jesus' calls us to follow him as his disciples (apprentices, learners). He invites us to be "all in," practicing, growing in faith, hope and love, and learning to live a life abundantly full, deeply meaningful, and joyful. And above all, to hear him say, "You know I love you."

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Children's Report, Playground Committee Update by Kathy Gordon

We have begun a new school year with a great start by Blessing of the Backpacks. From 2 to 11 Children have attended on Sundays for the last couple months, but now that school has begun, attendance has varied from 6 to 10 children, including a toddler. We need a dedicated nursery person.

The Children's Wing is being used more frequently now. The intense cleaning over the summer and just before school began has brought a shine to our space. Thank you for the lighting repairs, air conditioning repairs and plumbing repairs that were done over the summer. We are blessed to have the space we have to support homeschooling programs like Classical Conversations (on Mondays) and Veritas (Thursdays and Fridays), and Family Promise (four times a year for two weeks).

As far as the Playground Committee is concerned, many items have been checked off as completed, but there are still some outstanding items to address. The Eagle Scout Project by Sam Vestrem has halted progress as the west side of the fencing has revealed some complications. I will be meeting with Sam on Sunday to problem-solve steps forward. Thanks to a very generous donation, we are able to purchase a large playground equipment, but that is still in process. Thank you to Frank Gryta for being present on the work day with gardening tools to move the mulch around. Four pallets of mulch were distributed by about 6 families from Classical Conversations in about an hour—many hands made for light work. Justin La Cross has some finishing touches on the sandbox renovation to a kid clubhouse. The grass needs to be weeded from our new mulch, but otherwise, the playground is waiting for the safety areas around the fencing to be resolved before re-opening. Please caution those who may venture on the playground. Unsupervised children are not allowed on the playground, even when it is open—we need your help in reinforcing this rule when staff are not on duty. Our last major playground equipment will be ordered when fencing safety concerns are resolved.
